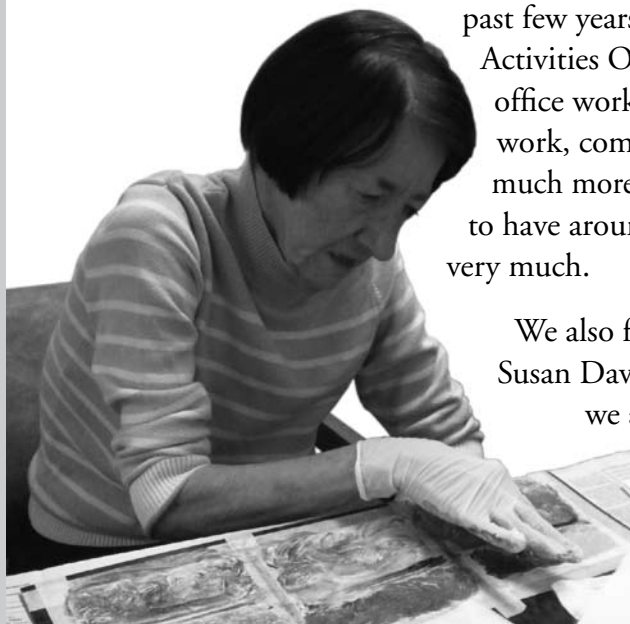

SUGGESTIONS FOR OUR GREAT VOLUNTEERS

ALTHOUGH YOU ARE ALL VERY SPECIAL and do a phenomenal job with our residents, all of us can use reminders now and then.

- ▼ When communicating with our folks, please be aware who is hard of hearing, who may be cognitively impaired, and who may have visual impairments or other barriers which may impact the way in which they respond.
- ▼ Make sure you are aware of any and all dietary restrictions before serving residents any food or drinks. Do their liquids need to be thickened? Can they feed themselves?
- ▼ Remember, nicknames are only permitted with the residents' approval.
- ▼ If taking residents outside, please be aware that some of our folks take medications that make them very susceptible to sunburns. Make sure they get sun tan lotion on exposed skin.
- ▼ Be aware of the need for good hand hygiene.
